Project II: Focus on Ovid and Horace: Due Finals Week

Directions:

- 1. Find the work of your assigned author that you wish to study
- 2. Collect credible on-line sites for your author, to be posted on our on-line syllabus
- 3. Do a bibliographic search on your author's life and works
- 4. Research and read secondary sources (analytical and commentary) on the work you have selected
 - 5. Read your work in English and select a poem/story to read closely in Latin
 - 6. Make a presentation to the class in which you will –
- a. Distribute your selected text in English and Latin, as well as your author's bibliography and a list of sources you used to analyze your selected work.
- b. Discuss the content, context, meter, vocabulary, and poetic devices in your selection
- c. What interpretations has the scholarship made of your work? Is it controversial? What is your position on these different perspectives?
- d. Compare the style, tone, poetry in your passage to the work of your author that we read in class (give specific examples)
